

We completed our ambitious 'Five Cubed' business plan which has seen the organisation grow by one third, support hundreds more artists and become almost 100% self-financing. Its stakeholders have rightly put faith into what has become a vital component of the Scottish arts and creative industries scene, which can only become more fruitful in the coming years.

Wasps was established to support creative practice by allowing artists the time and space to research, make work and experiment. We believe that the artists and arts organisations that we support inspire, entertain, educate and transform people's lives. Because many artists would struggle to pay market rents for commercial workspace, Wasps core work focuses on creating and managing a network of artists' studios at prices that artists across Scotland can afford.

Wasps has doubled in size in the last five years, investing public and private funds to improve the quality of workspaces and make them permanent by acquiring buildings for artists to use now and into the future. This year we expanded again, completing two important developments in Dundee and Glasgow supporting over 100 artists. Wasps started life some 35 years ago in Dundee and it's been a long held ambition to reinvest and create high quality studio facilities in the city just as Dundee embarks on the next phase of its cultural development. On pages 10 and 11 we highlight the work of two long-standing studio holders in Dundee.

This year we also completed South Block, a new cultural and creative industries complex in Glasgow's Merchant City. This is our first venture mixing studios for artists with commercial space for designers, architects, digital media practices and other creative companies. To deliver this, we set up Wasps' Creative Industries Community Interest Company, a new subsidiary which is now gifting its profits to the charity to support our work across the country, keeping artists rents affordable and making a huge contribution to the organisation becoming financially independant. Finally, on behalf of Wasps' staff and board I thank our Chair, Gerry Grams, wholeheartedly for his commitment to Wasps over many years. His passion, knowledge and expertise have been invaluable in achieving our success to date. We wish him every success in the future.

MEADOW MILL STUDIOS

DUNDEE

Back in 2008 we set out to deliver 'Five Cubed': a strategy to develop 5 buildings in 5 communities in 5 years. We aimed to create 140 more studios, support 150+ artists and double the size of the company by 2012/13. This increase in scale would allow us to generate enough of our own income so that we could exist and flourish without the need for revenue funding.

We have made excellent progress in achieving Five Cubed. Last year we completed new studio projects in Irvine and Kirkcudbright. This year, we successfully developed two large studio complexes in Dundee and Glasgow

Meadow Mill Studios is a former jute mill in the heart of Dundee. We had leased three floors from building owners, Dundee Industrial Association, for many years but the studios were in a dilapidated state with no fixed heating, poor access and were virtually unusable during the winter months.

Through the redevelopment we were able to make huge improvements to the studios by maximising natural light, reorganising the layout of the spaces and installing heating and a lift. We also renovated the fourth floor (pictured before redevelopment) increasing the lettable space by 50% to meet the high demand for workspace in Dundee.

Meadow Mill now houses 58 studios for up to 100 artists, an open plan space studio divided into smaller, cheaper bays for new graduates, and a beautiful new project space.

In recent years, Dundee has emerged as one of the country's most exciting cities for arts and culture. A big contributing factor is the fantastic facilities available – including the renowned Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art & Design, DCA, the award-winning new McManus Art Gallery and Museum and the jaw-dropping plans for the V&A Museum. Dundee's renaissance is also down to the growing artist community in the city and we're delighted they now have a studio building that they can take pride in.

Louise has collaborated with schools, community groups, museums and galleries, and hospitals. She has also worked with Angus Council Education Development Service and the Tayside Healthcare Trust delivering textile and surface pattern workshops.

ARTIST PROFILE DELIA BAILLIE

Delia Baillie has been based in Dundee since graduating in 1999. Her practice incorporates painting, drawing, printmaking and photography. She is a part-time lecturer at Duncan of Jordanstone College of Art and Design and an elected member of the Royal Scottish Academy.

Delia has exhibited extensively across the UK throughout her career. This year she has exhibited in the RSA annual exhibition in Edinburgh and the Flemings Scottish Summer Exhibition in London. She has been a recipient of a Hospitalfield House Residency and The Alastair Salvesen Travelling Scholarship Award.

"A studio complex has the potential to be an aspirational space for an entire community of artists including jewelers, textile artists, print-makers, painters, sculptors, photographers, illustrators and film makers. To pursue my professional practice I need an isolated studio, a space dedicated to development and experimentation away from the commitments of day-to-day life, as would architects, scientists, musicians and many others."

SOUTH BLOCK GLASGOW

This year we opened South Block, a £3.5 million conversion of an old textile warehouse in Glasgow's Merchant City. It now offers superb facilities for artists, arts organisations, creative companies and social enterprises working in the cultural sector. South Block houses 96 workspaces, an outdoor roof terrace, meeting rooms and 'All that is Solid' a great new coffee shop and design space on the ground floor.

South Block is a new venture for us, mixing commercial and subsidised studio space to support Glasgow's creative community. We use the money raised by renting space to commercial businesses to minimise the rent charged to artists and arts organisations across Scotland. Typically, rents charged to artists will be around half market rent. This can make all the difference to visual and applied artists who would otherwise be unable to afford the spaces they need to make work.

South Block will make a significant contribution to the regeneration of Glasgow's Merchant City and is predicted to contribute £69 million to the city's economy over the next 20 years.

It was made possible through investment from Creative Scotland, Scottish Enterprise, Scottish Investment Fund, European Regional Development Fund, Triodos Bank, Merchant City Initiative and Glasgow City Heritage Trust. Vital support was also provided by Glasgow City Council, which leased the building on an 80-year lease.



ARTIST PROFILE DIANE DAWSON

Following a career in event management and six years running her own business, Diane attended Glasgow School of Art, graduating from Painting and Printmaking in 2010. She was a recipient of the Glasgow Print Studio Prize and the Euan Stewart Memorial Prize. Since then she has exhibited in a number of shows, most notably the Royal Scottish Academy New Contemporaries Show 2011.

Diane moved into her studio in South Block this year. "I'm really excited about having my own studio and South Block is a fantastic building so I feel incredibly lucky to be here. It already feels like a real community and there's a great atmosphere."

Much of her work explores behaviour and habitats and often features animals presented in human scenarios. In her paintings animals are presented as character actors whilst many of her prints feature animals in situations which are out of place. "I find the idea of animals being made to mirror human behaviour really intriguing and through my work I'm interested in investigating that and the theme of how our own habitat sets the scene for how we perform in society and do what is expected of us."

ARTIST PROFILE JANIE NICOLL

Visual Artist, Janie Nicoll, originally studied painting at Janie's artworks often take the form of site-specific Edinburgh College of Art, gaining a First Class Honours degree and the Fine Art Department's Watt Medal for Academic Distinction. After gaining a post-graduate diploma at ECA, she spent a year in Budapest on a British Council scholarship before returning to Scotland and graduating from the Master of Fine Art course at Glasgow School of Art in 1997.

Since then she has achieved acclaim for her work, exhibiting widely throughout the UK and overseas at venues including East Street Art, Leeds, Wolverhampton Art Gallery, the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, Red Wire Gallery, Liverpool, Edinburgh Sculpture Warehouse, Intermedia Gallery at the CCA, Glasgow, the Crawford Gallery, Cork, Kunstlerhause in Dortmund, Germany and the Deviant Arts Festival, Trollhatten, Sweden among many others. Her video works have also been shown internationally, including the Museum of Modern Art, New York.

Her recent works have explored imagery connected to the urban landscape, and notions of masculinity, fraternity and rebellion. "For these, I've used easily accessible materials such as packing tape and perspex to form banners and sculpture that reinterpret Northern Soul insignia".

Janie said "South Block provides fantastic facilities for artists. It's great to see new life breathed into the old building and it really fulfilling its potential to become a thriving centre for a diverse community of artists, creative businesses and social enterprises. I'm delighted to be part of that".
